## Conference on Cincinnati, Kharkiv Oct. 13-15

Miami's history department will host a conference, "Parallel Cities, Different Paths: Cincinnati and Kharkiv in the 19th and 20th Centuries," Oct. 13-15. Prominent historians of urban America and of Ukraine and municipal officials from both sides will meet to discuss past and present issues these sister cities have in common. Organizer Robert W. Thurston (history) said the talks should be engaging and accessible to both scholars and the general public.
